Thank you for your request made under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA), received on 11 April 2025. You requested the following:

- 1. Could I request any briefings or reports on the predicted impact of the increases in interest rates that came in on April 1 on student loan repayments for those overseas?*
- 2. Could I also have any updates to the figures included in this release: <https://www.ird.govt.nz/media-releases/2024/focus-on-overseas-student-loan-and-child-support-debt> - in relation to student loans...particularly the numbers now owing or liable for interest payments and increases that may have flowed on from surging departure rates.*
- 3. I would also be interested in any update figures regarding people stopped at the border and what sort of amounts are owned by the top student loan debtors.*

On 17 April 2025, we transferred part 1 of your request for briefings or reports on the predicted impact of the increase in interest rates on student loan repayments for overseas-based borrowers (OBB) to the Ministry of Education under section 14(b)(ii) of the OIA.

Information being released

Part 2: OBB debt statistics

The OBB customer statistics in the media release referenced in part 2 of your request covers the period from September 2023 to September 2024. From 1 July 2024 to 31 March 2025, the number of OBBs has increased by 3,313, from 111,034 to 114,347. The number of OBB customers with a student loan in default has increased by 8,876.

11,822 student loan borrowers have active arrangements covering \$46.2m worth of outstanding student loan balances. Of these, 6,886 are OBBs and their arrangements account for \$34.3m, or 74.4%, of the amount under arrangement.

4,607 OBBs have paid off their loans since July 2024.

Part 3: Top 20 student loan debt amount and arrests at the border

As at 31 March 2025, the amount owing for the top 20 student loan debtors is \$4.094m.

Table 1 on the following page provides a breakdown by calendar year of border arrests related to student loan debt.
